JOB SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

Valid Washington State Driver's License and successful completion of a pre-employment background check. Knowledge of the safe operation and maintenance of assigned equipment, use and care of tools and equipment, parks maintenance operations and procedures including trail maintenance and construction, landscaping and grounds keeping or facilities. The employee must be able to lift 50 pounds. The employee must be able to obtain a (commercial drivers license) CDL within 90 days of hire. A Public Operator pesticide application license is required. The employee must have the ability to work in all PSII positions.

ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

- 1. Renovate, rehabilitate, and maintain athletic fields and large bodies of turf. Apply fertilizer and lime to irrigated fields. Perform aeration, over seeding, and top dressing of irrigated fields.
- 2. Operate, maintain and inspect a wide variety of equipment and tools related to parks management.
- 3. Apply erosion control materials to construction work sites, either apply mulch, straw, or hydro seed.
- 4. Inventory and order supplies, materials, and equipment. Perform record keeping.
- 5. Operate a 5-yard truck and trailer (requires a CDL).
- 6. Maintain trail corridors by control of nuisance or noxious weeds by application of herbicides. Perform recordkeeping per state and federal requirements.
- 7. Provide customer service by enforcing county ordinances, responding to customer complaints and questions, responding to emergency situations and managing special event traffic.
- 8. Plant native species plants, trees and grasses and stabilize riverbanks. Prune and transplant trees and shrubs.
- 9. Identify evaluate and possibly remove hazardous trees and noxious or nuisance vegetation.
- 10. Protect, inspect, renovate, repair, and maintain park properties, athletic fields, irrigated landscaped areas, trails, and wetlands.
- 11. Design and construct landscaped areas in accordance with accepted horticultural standards.
- 12. Complete appropriate forms, attend meetings and training sessions.
- 13. Inspect, repair and remove hazards. Post notices for the public. Perform emergency repairs or removal of unsafe conditions to maintain safety of park users.
- 14. Assist in the construct, install, and maintenance of drainage ditches, culverts, catch basins and trail water bars.

Most commonly occurs while maintaining equipment, performing welding/fabrication, installing fences, installing fence posts and installing signs.

Walking

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Frequently on grass, dirt, vegetation, cement, linoleum and uneven surfaces for distances of up to ¹/₂ mile for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while putting up tents/setting up for special events, setting up fencing, installing bollards, installing signs, backpack blowing, weed eating, and performing pavement cleaning.

Sitting

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_

Continuously on an automobile seat, tractor seat or office chair for up to 2 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while driving various County vehicles (including the 5-yard truck and trailer) and tractors (with side cutting attachment) as well as using a computer to complete a timesheet.

Climbing

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Rare on a ladder to heights of 10 feet for up to 10 seconds at a time for up to 5 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while climbing on to a roof to check a drain, on or off a tractor or 5-yard truck and trailer as well as on a ladder to replace a light bulb.

Balancing

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Occasionally for up to 15 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while loading/unloading equipment and materials in the back of a truck as well as traversing steep inclines and uneven surfaces. The employee also utilizes balance when climbing on and off of tractors/trucks as well as walking on a trailer ramp.

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Bending neck up

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Frequently for up to 1 hour at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while using a chainsaw and a blower as well as when installing fence posts and cleaning out drainage ditches.

Bending/Stooping

Occasionally on grass, dirt, vegetation, cement, linoleum and uneven surfaces for up to 15 minutes at a time for up to 2.5-3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while shoveling/using digging bar, installing fence posts, using a chainsaw, checking slope mower, welding, and using a hand blower.

Kneeling

Occasionally on grass, dirt, vegetation, cement, linoleum and uneven surfaces for up to 15 minutes at a time for up to 1.5 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while cleaning out drainage ditches, welding, shoveling and setting up for special events. The employee can alternate kneeling and crouching as needed.

Squatting

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Occasionally on grass, dirt, vegetation, cement, linoleum and uneven surfaces for up to 15 minutes at a time for up to 1.5 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while cleaning out drainage ditches, welding, shoveling and setting up for special events. The employee can alternate kneeling and crouching as needed.

Operating Controls with Feet

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Continuously and highly repetitive for up to 2 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while operating various County vehicles such as a motorized cart, forklift, 5-yard truck and trailer and tractor.

Reaching above shoulder height

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_ Occasionally for up to 30 seconds at a time for up to 45 minutes to 1 hour total in a work shift while, setting up tents for special events, installing signs, performing fence work and performing tree work.

Reaching at waist to shoulder height

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Continuously and highly repetitive for up to 2 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while driving various County vehicles, operating a tractor, welding, performing fence duties, replacing split rails, shoveling and performing tree duties.

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Reaching at knee to waist height

Occasionally for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift while shoveling, loading wood and manipulating supplies/materials/tools such as shovels, posts, fencing, bags of cement, dirt and asphalt.

Reaching at floor to knee height

Occasionally on grass, dirt, vegetation, cement, linoleum and uneven surfaces for up to 15 minutes at a time for up to 1.5 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while cleaning out drainage ditches, shoveling and setting up for special events.

Lifting 1-10 pounds

Occasionally up to 5 seconds at a time for up to 30 minutes total in a shift. Most commonly occurs with objects weighing 4-9 pounds while manipulating various hand tools, hand blower (6 pounds), and signs.

Carrying 1-10 pounds

Occasionally for distances of up to 100 feet for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 30 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 4-9 pounds while transporting various hand tools, hand blower (6 pounds), .

Lifting 11-20 pounds

Occasionally for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 1.5 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 15-20 pounds while, and backpack blower (20 pounds), herbicide containers, or partially filled bags of fertilizer or lime The employee also lifts when shoveling and manipulating chain binders.

Carrying 11-20 pounds

Occasionally for distances of up to 100 feet for up to 10-15 minutes at a time for up to 1.5 hour total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 20 pounds while using the backpack blower, herbicide containers, or partially filled bags of fertilizer or lime, or chainsaw as well as when transporting equipment to and from the truck.

Lifting 21-50 pounds

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Occasionally for up to 10 seconds at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 40-50 pounds while handling 50# bags of fertilizer and lime.

Carrying 21-50 pounds

Occasionally for distances of up to 50 feet for up to 2 minutes at a time for up to 1.5 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 40-50 pounds while transporting a, 5 gallon container of gasoline and drainage grates.

Pushing and Pulling

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_ Rarely for distances of up to 1 mile at a time with a force of up to 10-30 pounds for up to 10-15 minutes at a time and up to 4 hours total in a work shift while using spreaders.
