ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

- 1. Conducts in-home education visits with clients as described in the study protocols, providing a standard set of educational messages, supplies, and equipment.
- 2. Utilizes a computer generated home action plan based on protocols to improve the environmental quality of each home.
- 3. Records and monitors clients' progress towards the home action plan goals.
- 4. Makes recruitment phone calls as part of the recruitment team.
- 5. Conducts in-home environmental assessments according to research protocols and timelines using the Home Environmental Checklist for enrolled families.
- 6. Acts as liaison for study participants as they progress through the Better Homes for Asthma study (i.e., arrange for temporary housing &/or storage of possessions for participants during construction, additional testing of clients' homes, addressing participants questions and concerns).
- 7. Drives to client homes using a personal vehicle.

PHYSICAL DEMANDS AS JOB IS TYPICALLY PERFORMED

Continuously = occurs 66-100% of the time Frequently = occurs 33-66% of the time Occasionally = occurs 1-33% of the time

Highly Repetitive = Repeating the same motion every few seconds with little or no variation for more than two hours total per day.

Light per DOT but adjusted to Medium in this particular instance.

Light—exerting up to 20 pounds of force occasionally, and/or up to 10 pounds of force frequently and/or a negligible amount of force constantly. A job is light if involves less than or up to the indicated pounds

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of force and one or more of the following apply; walking and standing to a significant degree, sitting and pushing/pulling of arm or leg controls, or constant pushing and pulling to maintain a production rate even when weight is negligible.

Medium—exerting 20 to 50 pounds of force occasionally, and/or 25-50 pounds of force frequently, and/or 10-20 pounds of force constantly.

Standing

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Occasionally on cement, linoleum, grass, bark, wood, dirt, gravel and carpeted surfaces for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 10 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while using the copy machine, conducting fan tests and waiting for doors to be opened by clients. On a rare occasion the employee may need to stand for up to 20 minutes when conducting training.

Walking

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Occasionally on cement, linoleum, grass, bark, wood, dirt, gravel and carpeted surfaces for distances of up to 300 feet for up to 5 minutes at a time and up to 1 hour total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while walking to and from client residences as well as inspecting the exterior of the residences.

Sitting

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Continuously on an office chair or automobile seat for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while performing computer duties, talking on the telephone, interviewing clients and driving a vehicle with an automatic transmission.

Climbing stairs

Occasionally for up to 3 minutes at a time while climbing up to 3 flights for up to 12 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while walking to and from client residences, which may be on the third story. Employee climbs stairs while transporting bag of equipment that weights approximately 40 pounds. It is not necessary to carry the bag with the HVS4, as is equipped with wheels and is best rolled/pulled up stairs.

Balancing

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_

Occasionally on uneven surfaces, slippery surfaces, dirt and gravel for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 20 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while walking to and from client residences that may be poorly maintained and taking pictures.

Bending neck up

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Occasionally for up to one minute at a time for up to 8 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while inspecting residences for water damage and cracks as well as when inspecting bathroom fans.

Bending neck down

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_

Frequently for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while reading maps, obtaining maps online, taking notes, performing dust collection duties and performing home inspections.

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Bending/Stooping

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_

Frequently on cement, linoleum, and carpeted surfaces for up to 10 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while removing supplies and files from low cabinets and shelves, picking objects up off of the floor, measuring mold, performing vacuum demonstrations and checking for mold in cabinets as well as cleaning, assembling and disassembling the HVS4. The employee might be able to reduce bending/stooping by alternating with squatting or kneeling if needed.

Kneeling

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_

Frequently on cement, linoleum, and carpeted surfaces for up to 10 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while removing supplies and files from low cabinets and shelves, picking objects up off of the floor, measuring mold, performing vacuum demonstrations and checking for mold in cabinets as well as cleaning, assembling and disassembling the HVS4. The employee might be able to reduce kneeling by alternating with bending/stooping or squatting if needed.

Squatting

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Frequently on cement, linoleum, and carpeted surfaces for up to 10 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while removing supplies and files from low cabinets and shelves, picking objects up off of the floor, measuring mold, performing vacuum demonstrations and checking for mold in cabinets as well as cleaning, assembling and disassembling the HVS4. The employee might be able to reduce squatting by alternating with bending/stooping or kneeling if needed.

Crawling

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Rare on flat carpeted or linoleum surfaces for distances of up to 20 feet for up to 20 seconds at a time for up to 20 seconds total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while measuring molds as well as cleaning, assembling and disassembling the HVS4.

Operating Controls with Feet

Frequently for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 4 hours total in a work shift while driving a vehicle with a personal vehicle with an automatic transmission as well as operating the HVS4.

Reaching above shoulder height

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Rare for up to 15 seconds at a time for up to 1 minute total in a work shift while removing and replacing files on high shelves or in high cabinets as well as conducting fan tests.

Reaching at waist to shoulder height

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Continuously for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while typing, driving a personal vehicle, writing, performing vacuum demonstrations and obtaining samples.

Reaching at knee to waist height

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Frequently on cement, linoleum, and carpeted surfaces for up to 10 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while removing supplies and files from low cabinets and shelves, loading and unloading equipment from a vehicle, measuring mold,

performing vacuum demonstrations and checking for mold in cabinets as well as cleaning, assembling and disassembling the HVS4.

Reaching at floor to knee height

Frequently on cement, linoleum, and carpeted surfaces for up to 10 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while removing supplies and files from low cabinets and shelves, loading and unloading equipment from a vehicle, measuring mold, performing vacuum demonstrations and checking for mold in cabinets as well as cleaning, assembling and disassembling the HVS4.

Lifting 1-10 pounds

Occasionally for up to 30 seconds at a time for up to 15 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 1-8 pounds while removing and replacing files and supplies as well as using the assessment tools.

Carrying 1-10 pounds

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Occasionally for distances of up to 300 feet for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 1 hour total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 1-8 pounds while transporting files, supplies and assessment tools to and from the client residences. The employee may need to carry their assessment tools up three flights of stairs two times per shift.

Lifting 11-20 pounds

Rare for up to 5 seconds at a time for up to 5 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 15-20 pounds while manipulating an equipment bag in and out of a vehicle.

Carrying 11-20 pounds

Occasionally for distances of up to 300 feet for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 1 hour total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 15-20 pounds while transporting an equipment bag to and from client residences.

Lifting 21-50 pounds

Rare for up to 5 seconds at a time for up to 5 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 40 pounds while manipulating an equipment bag in and out of a vehicle.

Pushing and Pulling

Occasionally for distances of up to 300 feet for up to 5 minutes at a time with a force of 10-20 pounds for up to 45 minutes total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while pushing or pulling a wheeled equipment bag to and from client residences and vacuuming.

Handling

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Frequently for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 5 hours total in a work shift while vacuuming and driving a vehicle as well as manipulating equipment bags, cleaning materials, door mats and the HVS4.

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Operating Controls with Hands

Health Care Provider initials if restricted

Frequently for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 4 hours total in a work shift while driving a vehicle with a personal vehicle with an automatic transmission as well as operating the HVS4.

Fingering

Health Care Provider initials if restricted Frequently for up to 1 hour at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift while performing computer duties, writing, manipulating a measuring tape, performing assessments and manipulating paperwork.

Feeling

Rare for up to 5 seconds at a time for up to 30 seconds total in a work shift while feeling walls and floors for moisture and dust as well as feeling water temperature.

Talking

Continuously for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while conversing with co-workers and superiors as well as when using the telephone and conducting client interviews.

Hearing

Health Care Provider initials if restricted_ Continuously for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while conversing with co-workers and superiors as well as when using the telephone and conducting client interviews.

Seeina

Continuously for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 7 hours total in a work shift while performing computer work, driving, performing inspections of client households and reading maps as well as reviewing, completing and modifying interview worksheets.

Working with Heightened Awareness Health Care Provider initials if restricted Continuously for up to 2.5 hours at a time for up to 7 hours total in a work shift while maintaining close attention to detail and identifying clues of potential health hazards when performing inspections. The employee also has direct interaction with the general public which can include potentially hostile persons.

ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS

Work is performed in an office setting as well as the homes of the general public. Workers are exposed to potentially contagious or infectious conditions, cigarette smoke, the general public, potentially hostile persons, domestic animals, infestation and unsanitary conditions.
