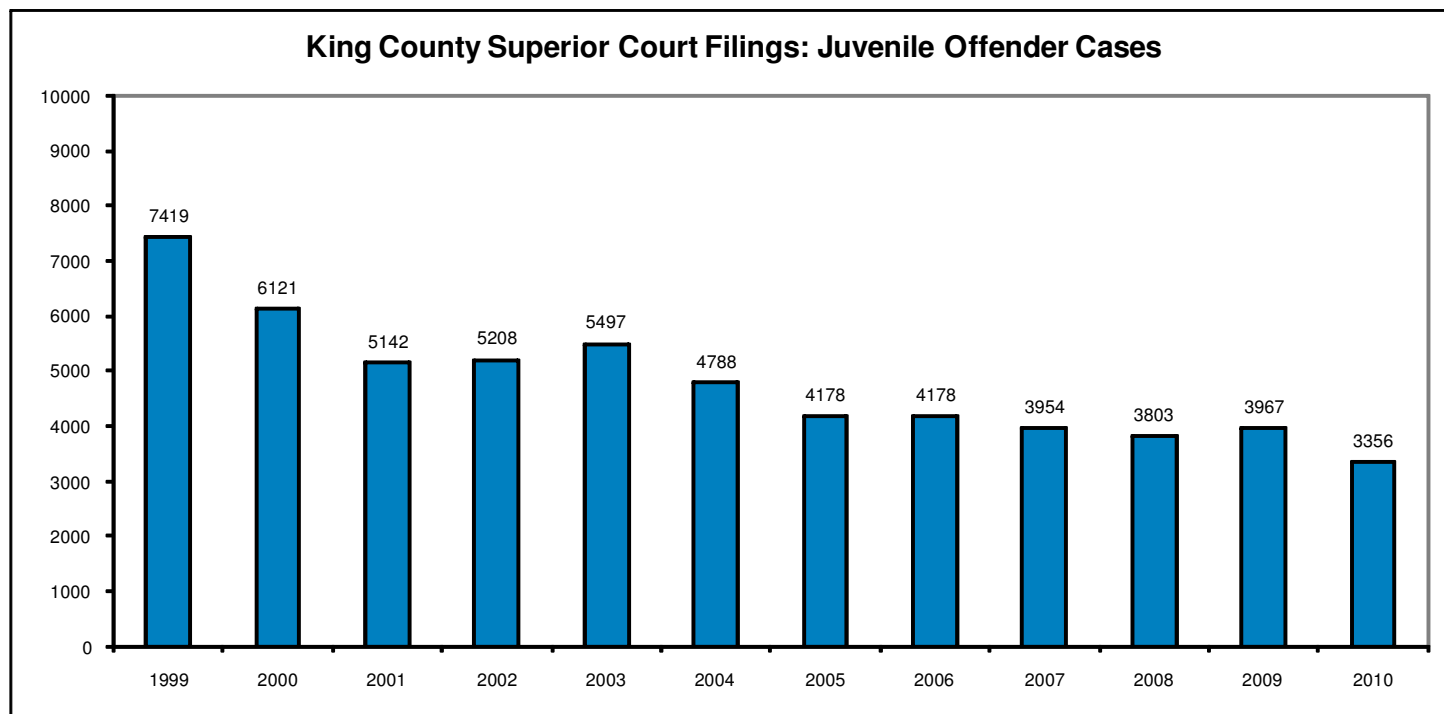


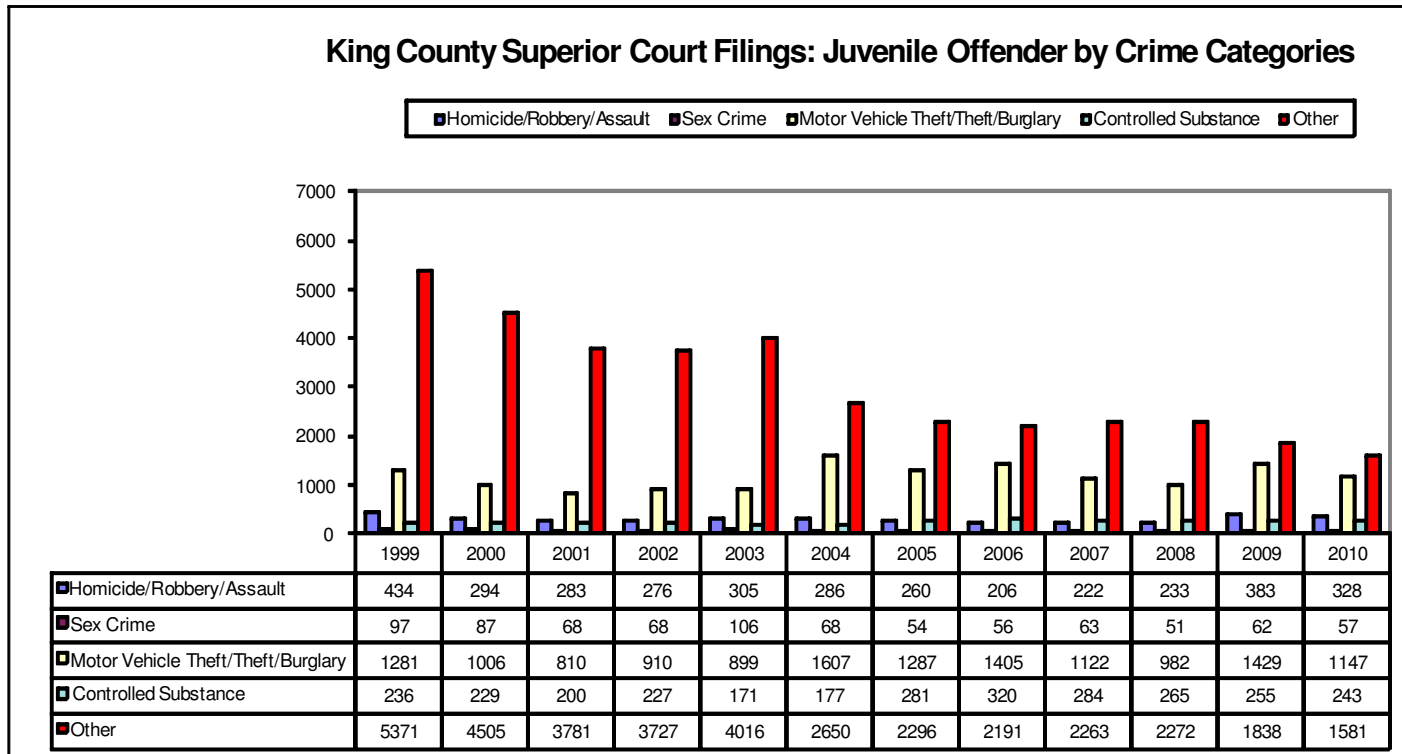
## King County Superior Court: Juvenile Offender Filings



All crime categories are based on the definitions of Washington State Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC). No further regrouping is carried out for the purpose of consistency.

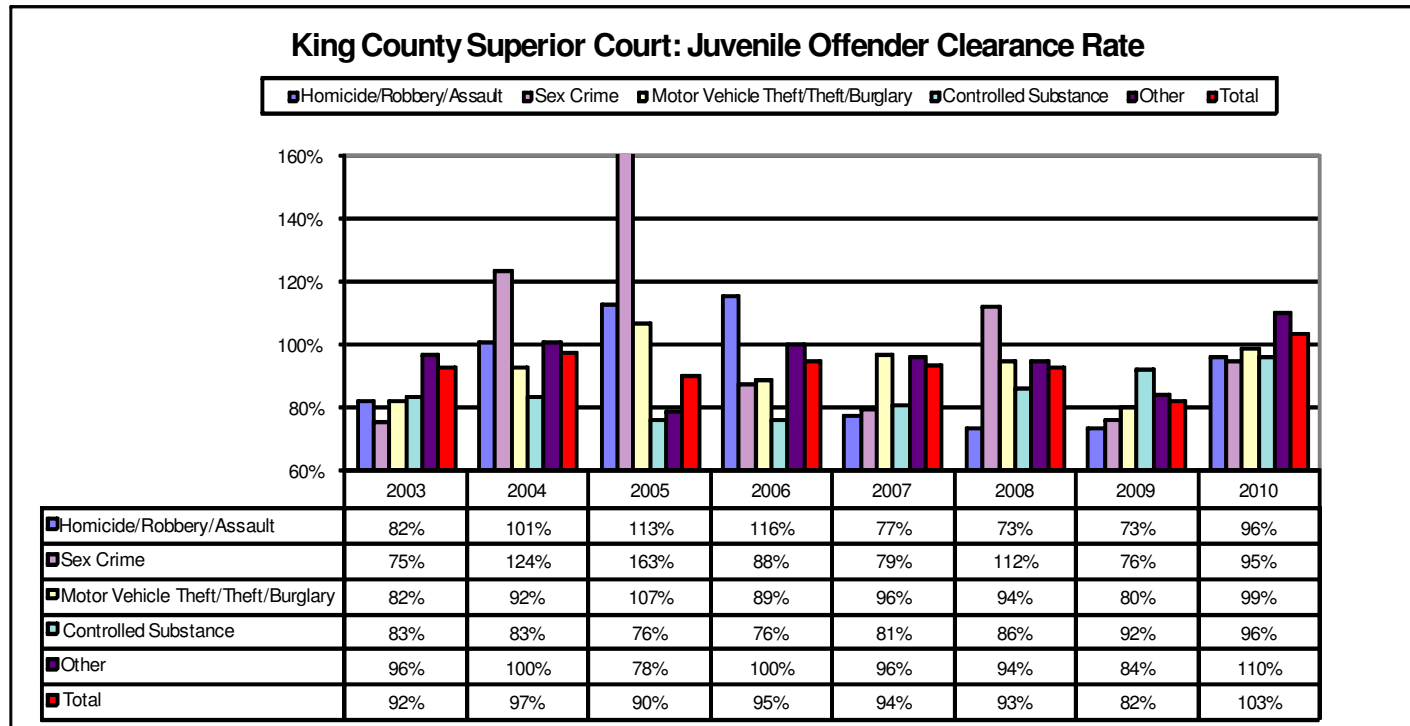
**The decline in juvenile offender filings has been influenced by: 1) a change of filing standard by the Prosecutor's Office in 2000; 2) an enhancement to diversion program referrals in 2002); and 3) a categorical change for the "detention only" filings in 2005.**

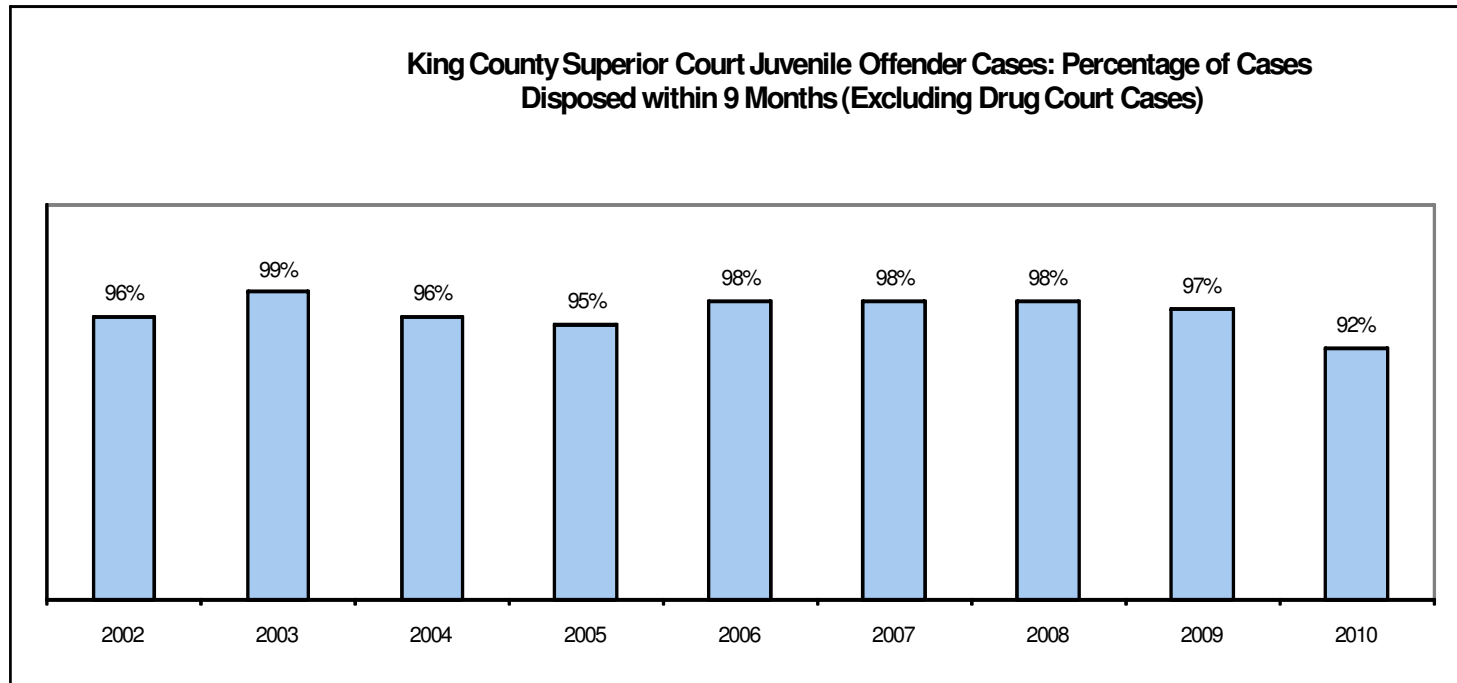
## King County Superior Court: Juvenile Offender Clearance Rate



All crime categories are based on the definitions of Washington State Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC). No further regrouping is carried out for the purpose of consistency.

Clearance rate is defined as the number of resolved (outgoing) cases as a percentage of the number of new filing (incoming) cases in the same year. A number over 100% indicates that the court disposes of more cases than it receives.

## King County Superior Court: Juvenile Offender Cases – Time to Disposition

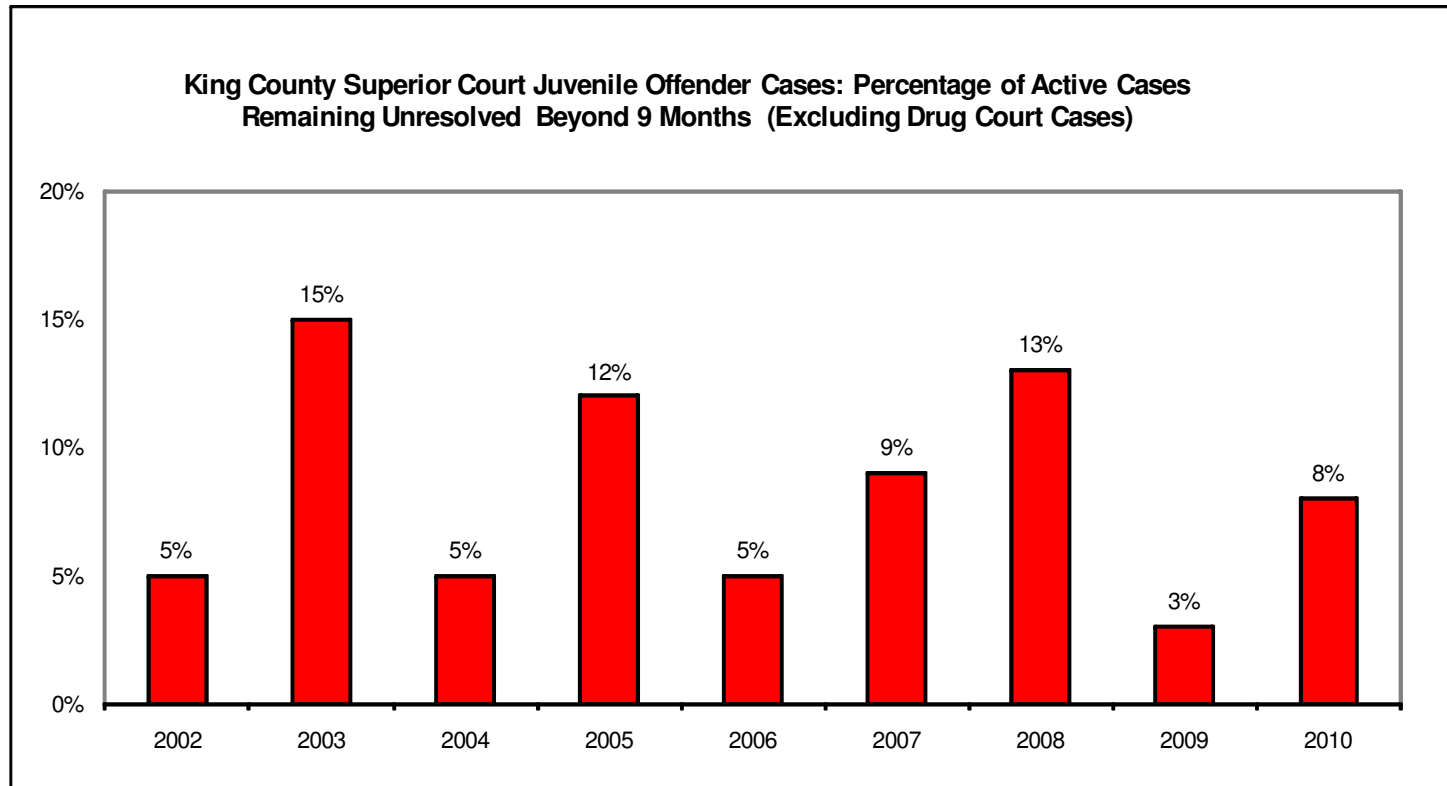


Time to disposition shows the percentage of cases disposed or otherwise resolved within the established time frames.

The number represents the percentage of disposed cases that were resolved within the state time guideline – 100% within 9 months after filing. The goal is to achieve 100% within 9 months.

Drug court cases are excluded since it takes much longer to resolved those cases enrolled in drug court.

## King County Superior Court: Juvenile Offender Cases – Age of Active Pending Caseload



The age of the active cases pending before the court, measured as the percentage of pending cases that have exceeded the existing state guidelines for disposition – 100% within 9 months after filing.

The number represents the percentage of active pending cases that remain on unresolved beyond 9 months. Our goal is to reduce this percentage closer to zero percent (0%).
