WORK HOURS

40 hours per week, at the present time all positions are 5X8 shift; day, swing and graveyard shifts, (2) fifteen-minute breaks, and one 30-minute lunch/dinner break.

JOB DESCRIPTION

Performs various cleaning activities primarily at bus shelters and transit centers, including; cleaning comfort stations, picking up litter, washing windows, cleaning graffiti, emptying trash cans and sweeping. The incumbent is also responsible for being able to flag, direct automobile and pedestrian traffic, perform landscaping cleanup and drive a full-size pick-up truck.

ESSENTIAL ABILITIES FOR ALL KING COUNTY JOB CLASSIFICATIONS

1. Ability to demonstrate predictable, reliable, and timely attendance.
2. Ability to follow written and verbal directions and to complete assigned tasks on schedule.
3. Ability to read, write & communicate in English and understand basic math.
4. Ability to learn from directions, observations, and mistakes, and apply procedures using good judgement.
5. Ability to work independently or part of a team; ability to interact appropriately with others.
6. Ability to work with supervision, receiving instructions/feedback, coaching/counseling and/or action/discipline.

JOB SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

Must have related experience and familiarity with common hand tools and cleaning equipment. Must possess a valid Washington State Driver's License. Must have the ability to work outdoors in all weather conditions and to perform repetitive physical tasks such as bending, reaching, stooping, lifting and standing.

ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS Listed in order of importance

1. Cleans and stocks comfort station restrooms, remove graffiti and empty trash.
2. Cleans in and around transit facilities working in indoor and outdoor environments.
3. Picks up trash, empties waste containers, and removes used chewing gum.
4. Washes glazing in bus passenger shelters.
5. Removes graffiti from glazing, wood, and metal parts of shelters.
6. Removes garbage from trash receptacles and installs plastic liners.
7. Works in landscaped areas to spread beauty bark, remove litter and debris, removes weeds from around plants and assist grounds specialist in trimming ivy, shrubbery, and hedges.
8. Transports debris and garbage to waste disposal sites using a light truck or van.

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9. Loads and unloads supplies at Park and Rides and transit bases.
10. Cleans shelter and platform area, shovels snow and spreads ice melt.
11. Reports vandalism and maintenance problems.
12. Responds to customer concerns and complaints.

NON-ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

1. Pressure wash various areas and facilities.
2. Participate in various committees.
3. Strip and wax floors.

TOOLS, MACHINES, EQUIPMENT, PRODUCTS, AND SERVICES USED

Full-size truck (with automatic transmission), broom, squeegee, litter tongs, hand-held blower, mop, general gardening tools, rake, shovel, weeding fork, pruners, lawn mower, dust pan, pressure washer, trash receptacles, various cleaning products, ladder, paper towels, toilet paper, soap, hoe, vacuum, chain saw and hand saws.

Standing

Frequently on cement, concrete, grass, dirt, carpet, linoleum, tile, wood, steep inclines, gravel and uneven surfaces for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 5 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while weed eating, mowing, cleaning restrooms and cleaning comfort stations.

Walking

Frequently on cement, concrete, grass, dirt, carpet, linoleum, tile, wood, steep inclines, gravel and uneven surfaces for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 4 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while cleaning shelters, comfort stations and transit centers.

Sitting

Occasionally on an automobile seat for up to 1.5 hours at a time and up to 3 hours total in a shift while driving to and from work sites.

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Climbing stairs

Occasionally for up to 1 flight for up to 30 seconds at a time for up to 45 minutes total in a shift. Most commonly occurs while climbing in an out of a pick-up truck, pruning bushes and washing walls in comfort stations.

Climbing

Occasionally for up to 30 seconds at a time for up to 45 minutes total in a shift. Most commonly occurs while climbing in an out of a pick-up truck.

Balancing

Occasionally on a ladder at heights of up to 4 feet for up to 30 minutes at a time and up to 2 hours total in a shift while pruning and washing walls in comfort stations and bus shelters as well as when traversing uneven ground and steep inclines.

Bending/Stooping

Frequently on cement, concrete, grass, dirt, carpet, linoleum, tile, wood, steep inclines, gravel and uneven surfaces for up to 2 hours at a time for up to 4 hours total in a shift while weeding and performing landscaping duties.

Kneeling

Occasionally on cement, concrete, grass, dirt, carpet, linoleum, tile, wood, steep inclines, gravel and uneven surfaces for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while weeding and performing landscaping duties.

Crouching

Occasionally on cement, concrete, grass, dirt, carpet, linoleum, tile, wood, steep inclines, gravel and uneven surfaces for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while weeding and performing landscaping duties.

Crawling

Occasionally on grass, dirt, steep inclines and uneven surfaces for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs while weeding and performing landscaping duties.

Operating Controls with Feet

Occasionally for up to 1.5 hours at a time and up to 3 hours total in a shift while driving to and from work sites.

Reaching above shoulder height

Frequently for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 5 hours in a shift while pruning as well as washing walls and ceilings in bus shelters and comfort stations.

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Reaching at waist to shoulder height

Frequently for up to 1.5 hours at a time for up to 5 hours total in a work shift while driving, raking, mopping and pruning as well as cleaning bus shelters and comfort stations.

Reaching at knee to waist height

Frequently for up to 10 minutes at a time for up to 4 hours total in a work shift while driving, raking, mopping and pruning as well as cleaning bus shelters and comfort stations.

Reaching at floor to knee height

Occasionally for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work whiles while weeding and performing landscaping duties.

Lifting 1-10 pounds

Continuously for up to 1 hour at a time for up to 8 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 2-5 pounds while using various hand tools, garden tools and cleaning equipment.

Carrying 1-10- pounds

Occasionally for distances of up to 40 feet for up to 30 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights 2-5 pounds while using various hand tools, garden tools and cleaning equipment.

Lifting 11-20 pounds

Occasionally for up to 15 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 13-18 pounds while loading and unloading equipment and trash as well as when using the weed eater.

Carrying 11-20 pounds

Occasionally for distances of up to 40 feet for up to 10 minutes at a time for up to 3 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 13-18 pounds while loading and unloading equipment (such as a ladder) and trash as well as when using the weed eater.

Lifting 21-50 pounds

Occasionally for up to 1 minute at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 30-50 pounds while manipulating cases of can liners, toilet paper and paper towels as well as when spreading bags of beauty bark, topsoil and sand.

Carrying 21-50 pounds

Occasionally for up to 40 feet for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 2 hours total in a work shift. Most commonly occurs with weights of 30-50 pounds while

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loading and unloading cases of can liners, toilet paper and paper towels as well as when spreading bags of beauty bark, topsoil and sand.

Pushing and Pulling

Frequently for distances of up to 40 feet for up to 1 hour at a time with a force of up to 20 pounds for up to 5 hours total in a work while mowing.

Handling

Continuously for up to 3 hours at a time for up to 8 hours total in a shift while using various hand tools, garden tools and cleaning equipment as well as when driving and operating equipment such as a pressure washer, weed eater, blower, lawn mower and vacuum.

Operating Controls with Hands

Occasionally for up to 1.5 hours at a time and up to 3 hours total in a shift while driving to and from work sites as well as operating a pressure washer, weed eater, blower, lawn mower and vacuum.

Fingering

Continuously for up to 3 hours at a time for up to 8 hours total in a shift while weeding, changing can liners, cleaning bus shelters and comfort stations and using small hand tools as well as replacing toilet paper, paper towels and soap.

Feeling

Continuously for up to 3 hours at a time for up to 8 hours total in a shift while identifying mechanical failure when operating equipment such as a pressure washer, weed eater, blower, lawn mower and vacuum.

Talking

Occasionally for up to 5 minutes at a time for up to 5 hours in a total in a shift while conversing with co-workers and supervisors about work duties.

Hearing

Continuously for up to 3 hours at a time for up to 8 hours total in a shift while driving as well as when identifying potential hazards such as moving machinery and traffic.

Near acuity—clarity of vision at 20 inches or less

Frequently for up to 1 hour at a time for up to 4 hours total in a work shift while reading the gauges while driving, reading the labels on cleaning products, using hand tools and reading work orders.

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Far acuity—clarity of vision at 20 feet or more

Frequently for up to 2 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while driving and cleaning shelters as well as identifying potential hazards such as moving vehicles and approaching persons.

Depth perception—three dimensional vision

Frequently for up to 2 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while driving and cleaning shelters as well as identifying potential hazards such as moving vehicles and approaching persons.

Field of vision—observing an area that can be seen up and down or right or left while eyes are fixed on a given point

Frequently for up to 2 hours at a time for up to 6 hours total in a work shift while driving and cleaning shelters as well as identifying potential hazards such as moving vehicles and approaching persons.

Night vision--seeing after sundown with minimal or no supplemental light sources

Continuously for up to 3 hours at a time for up to 9 hours total in a work shift while working the night shift.
