





Use a black ink pen to completely fill in the oval next to your choice.


How to correct a mistake

This measure would allow police, family, or household members to obtain court orders temporarily preventing firearms access by persons exhibiting mental illness, violent or other behavior indicating they may harm themselves or others. If approved, this proposition would restore Shoreline’s levy rate to help fund police/emergency protection including neighborhood patrols and crime prevention; preserve parks, trails, playgrounds/playfields and Shoreline pool; and maintain community services including senior center and youth programs.</p> <p>This proposition would set Shoreline’s maximum property tax rate to \$1.39/ \$1,000 of assessed valuation for collection in 2017; set the limit factor for 2018-2022 at 100% plus annual inflation (Seattle CPI-U); and use the 2022 levy amount to calculate subsequent levy limits.</p> <p>Should this proposition be approved?</p> <p><input type="radio"/> Yes</p> <p><input type="radio"/> No</p>

This measure would expand light-rail, commuter-rail, and bus rapid transit service to connect population and growth centers, and authorize Sound Transit to levy or impose: an additional 0.5% sales and use tax; a property tax of \$0.25 or less per \$1,000 of assessed valuation; an additional 0.8% motor-vehicle excise tax; and use existing taxes to fund the local share of the \$53.8 billion estimated cost (including inflation), with continuing independent audits, as described in the Mass Transit Guide and Resolution No. R2016-17.
