## Important – Please Read

This inventory is a point in time count of emergency shelter, transitional housing and safe haven units/beds specifically dedicated for homeless people. In this inventory:

- Program capacity is represented by both units and beds. The unit number represents the number of households that a given program can serve at one time, while the bed number represents the maximum number of individual persons that could live in those units. For programs serving family households (young parents, women with children, and families with children) these two figures differ, while for programs serving single person households (youth / young adults, single women, single men, and single adults) the number of units and the number of beds are the same
- Emergency shelter is separated into fixed (facility-based) capacity and flexible (i.e., hotel/motel voucher programs).
- Youth (under age 18) and Young Adults (age 18 and older) are served by many of the same agencies, and are often discussed as a single population group. There are, however, differences between the two groups and in the requirements for working with them (i.e., minors as opposed to adults). In this report, while they are combined in the summary tables and charts, the two groups are shown separately in the more detailed tables.
- Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing and Safe Havens are key to meeting the immediate safety and interim housing and service needs of persons who are homeless, but the ultimate goal is "permanent housing", with no time-limits on tenancy. There are permanent housing projects that are specifically designated for formerly homeless people. Some are specifically designed for persons with certain disabilities who need ongoing case management and services to maintain their housing, some are in properties with on-site resources and services, and others are "merely" units designated for households coming out of homelessness. Identifying these units/beds is beyond the scope of this report.

## PART A: Executive Summary

In the Seattle/King County region, there is an extensive network of facility-based emergency shelter, transitional housing, safe haven and permanent housing programs that specifically target homeless people. The following charts summarize the emergency shelter and transitional housing capacity identified at this point in time. More details about this capacity are provided in the main body of this report.

## PART B: Emergency Shelter Resources

---

### 1. Summary

**Emergency Shelter** is defined as temporary shelter from the elements and unsafe streets for homeless individuals and families. In Seattle-King County, shelter programs are either fixed capacity (facility-based) or flexible capacity (i.e., hotel/motel vouchers, etc.). Homeless people staying in emergency shelters typically have their basic health, food, clothing, and personal hygiene needs addressed, and they receive information and referral about supportive services and housing in our community. Shelters range from mats on the floor in a common space to beds in individual units.

There is an extensive network of emergency shelter facilities in Seattle/King County with a total year round capacity of approximately 1,909 units / 2,500 beds. Additional shelter, with varying capacity, is provided through numerous hotel/motel voucher programs. During the winter months, October through March, shelter capacity is further expanded.

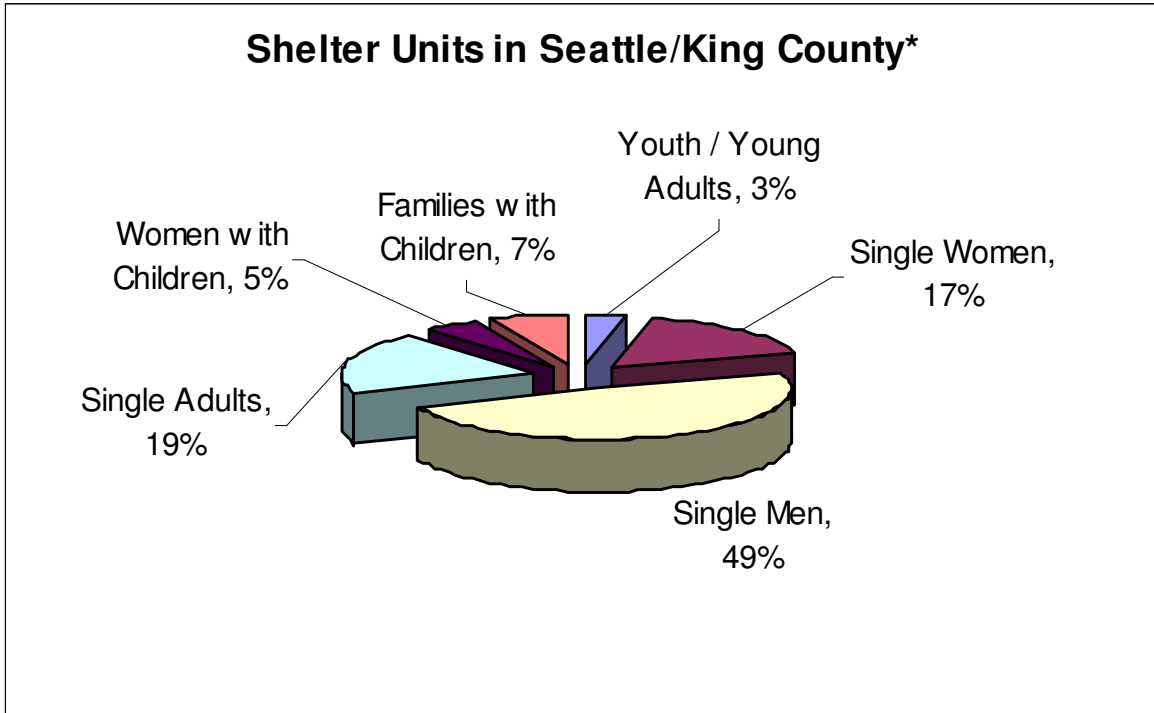

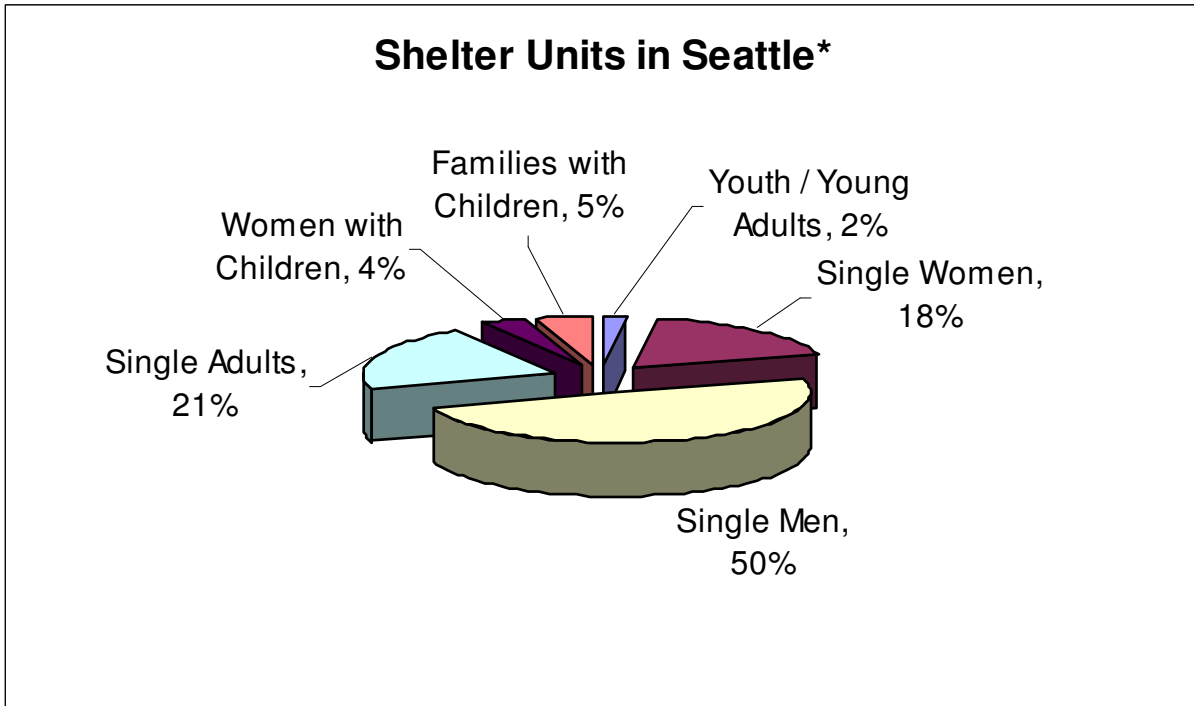

# Pie Charts – Year Round Facility-Based Emergency Shelter Units

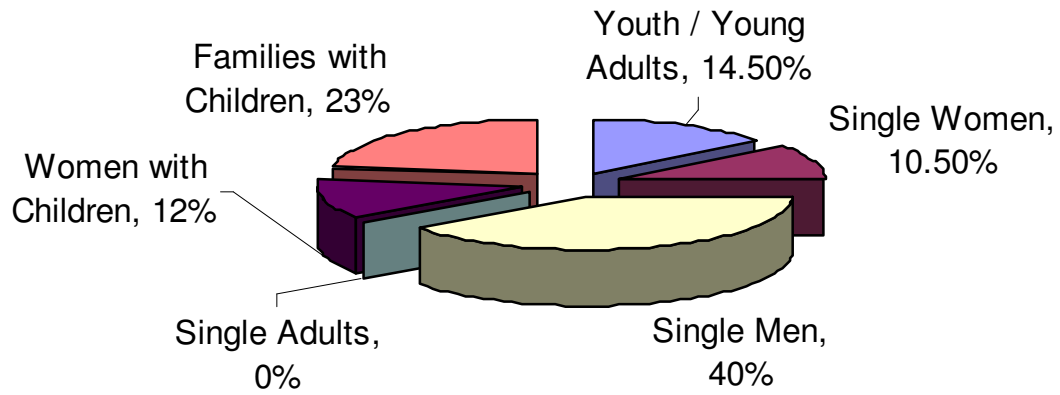

# PART C: Transitional Housing Resources

## 1. Summary

Transitional Housing is defined as temporary housing (90 days to 24 months) with supportive services designed to help people make the transition from homelessness to permanent housing. In Seattle-King County, there are two models of transitional housing: (1) traditional facility-based programs that enable homeless people to benefit from a peer group setting, a time-limited length of stay, and/or a confidential location, and (2) Transition-in-Place programs in which supportive services are time-limited while the housing unit is not. Once clients no longer need the services, they have the opportunity to stay in the affordable units in which they have been living. In both models, individual needs of the clients determine the type and intensity of services needed to promote residential stability, increased skill level and/or income, and greater self-determination.

A total of 1,975 transitional housing units / 4,304 beds are routinely available in Seattle/King County to assist formerly homeless people as they regain stability in their lives. Included in this inventory are traditional models of transitional housing where residents benefit from a peer group setting as well as Transition-in-Place models. See pages 34 - 36 for pie charts.

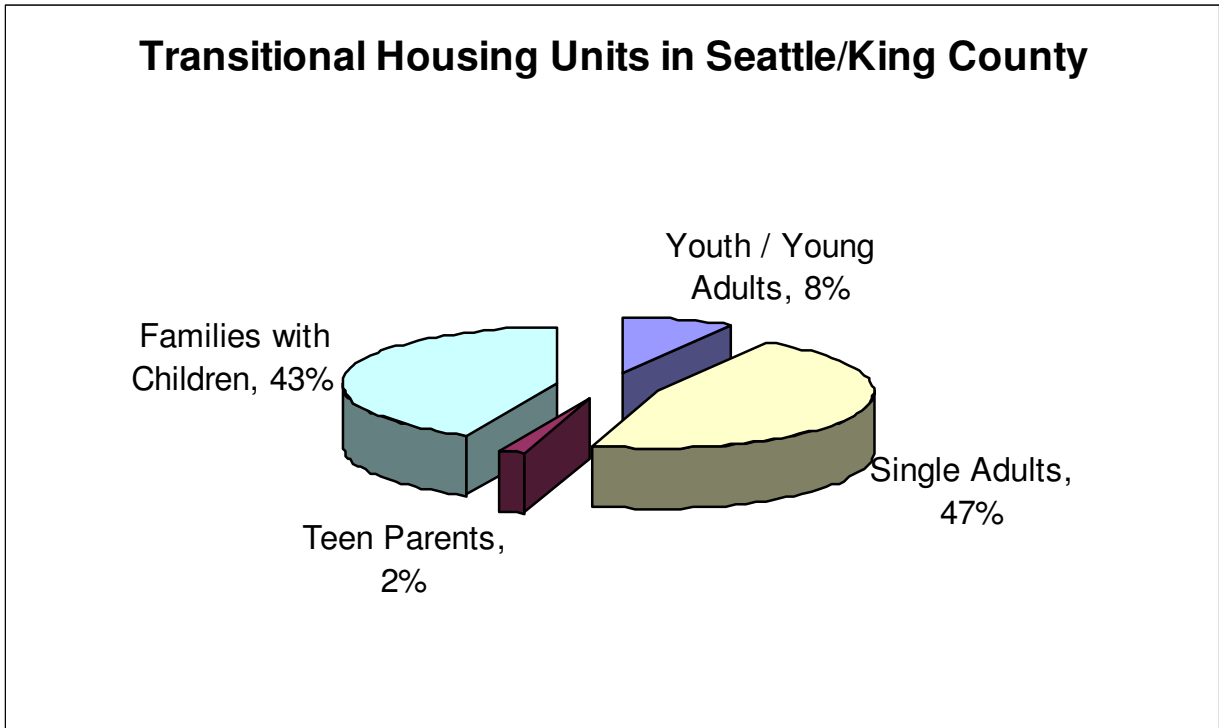

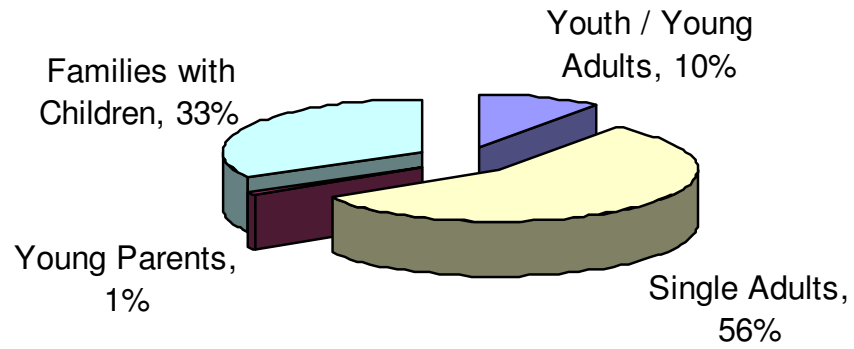

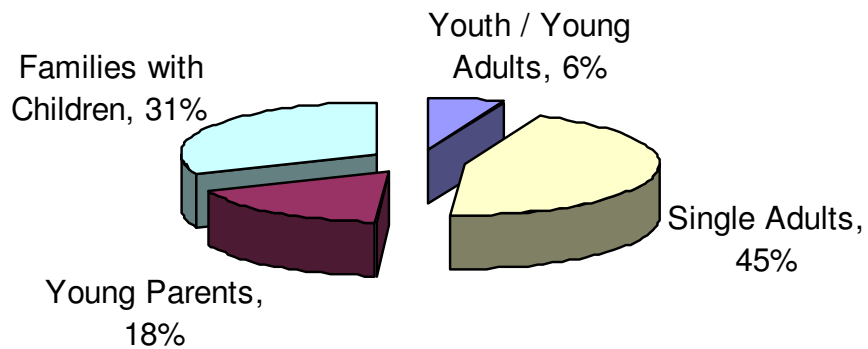
## 6. Pie Charts – Transitional Housing Units



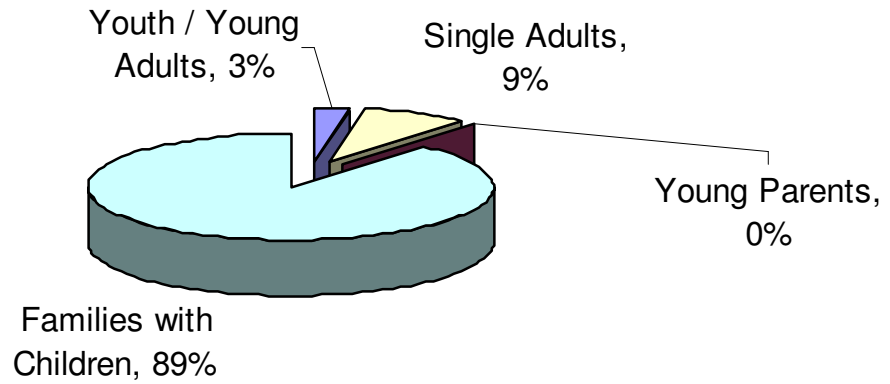
## Transitional Housing Units in Seattle



## Transitional Housing Units in North King County

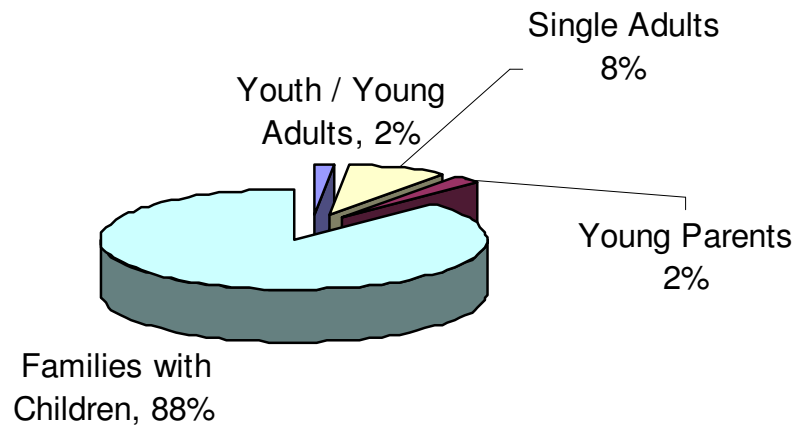


## Transitional housing Units in East King County

## PART D: Safe Havens

---

A Safe Haven is a form of low-barrier supportive housing that serves hard-to-reach persons with severe mental illness who are homeless on the street and have been unable or unwilling to participate in housing or supportive services. Safe Havens serve as a portal of entry providing basic needs (such as food, showers, clothing), as well as a safe and decent residential alternative for participants who need time to adjust to life off the streets and to develop a willingness and trust to accept services. Although staff work with residents to eventually pursue more independent living, there is no time-limit for how long an individual may reside in a Safe Haven.

Until recently, Safe Havens were classified as either transitional or permanent housing. As of 2009 the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has given them their own category - the Safe Haven.

## APPENDIX

### Amended chart of Transitional Housing in Seattle/King County in 2007

The Inventory of Homeless Units and Beds is updated regularly because there is change in the inventory from year to year as new projects come on-line or existing projects add/subtract units or close entirely.

Between 2007 (the last year this report was published) and 2009, in addition to these usual changes a number of projects were removed from the transitional housing inventory. They were removed for one of three reasons:

- 1) the project was re-categorized as a Safe Haven (20 units/beds);
- 2) the project was a voucher program, and the number of vouchers previously cited was the total annual allotment rather than a point-in-time number (45 units/beds); or
- 3) the project provides transitional housing but for reasons other than homelessness (i.e., mental health), and the persons served may or may not be homeless (179 units/beds)

These projects still exist and are providing much needed housing to vulnerable populations, but are not appropriate to this transitional housing inventory.

The following is an amended table of "Transitional Housing in Seattle/King County in 2007". It does not include the above referenced units.
