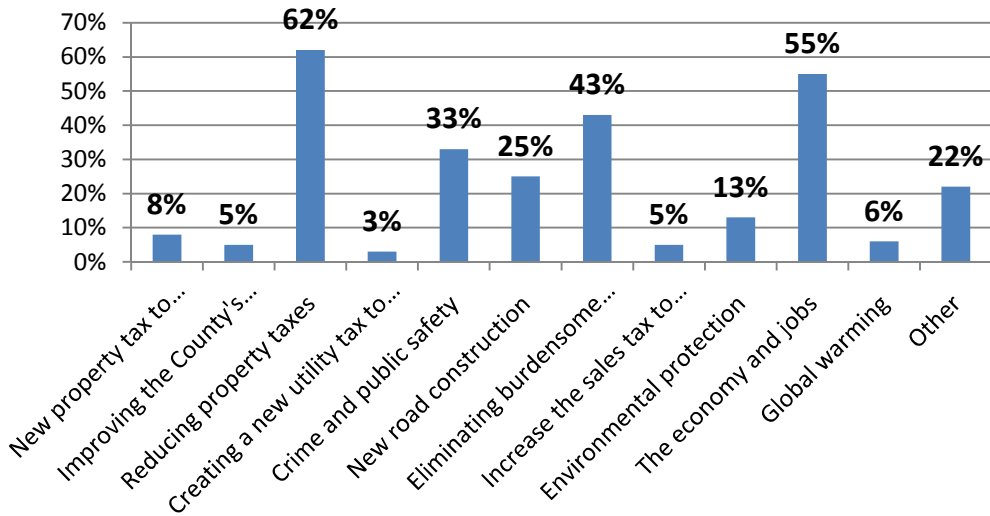


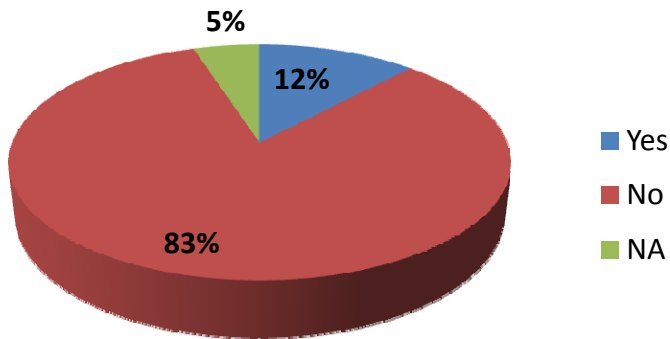

**1. Please select the top three issues facing King County today:**

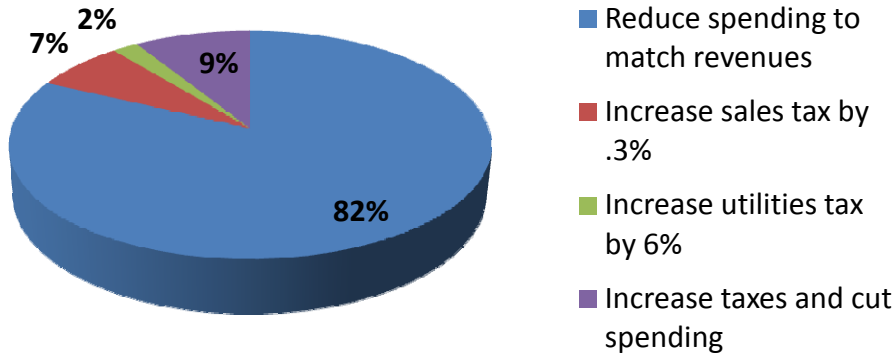

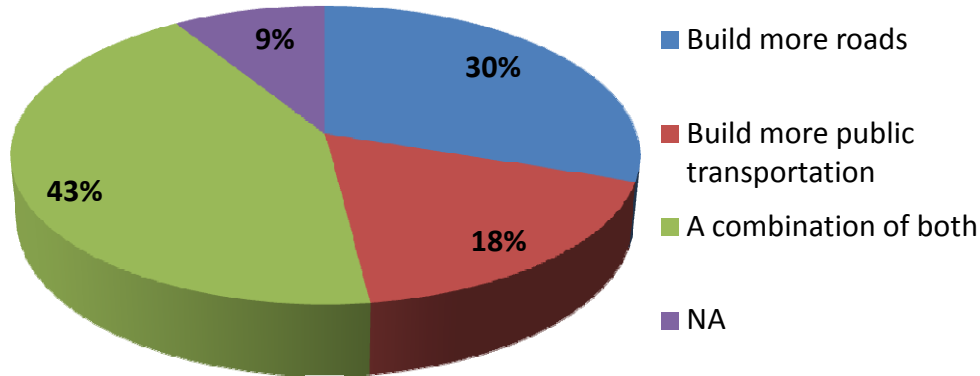

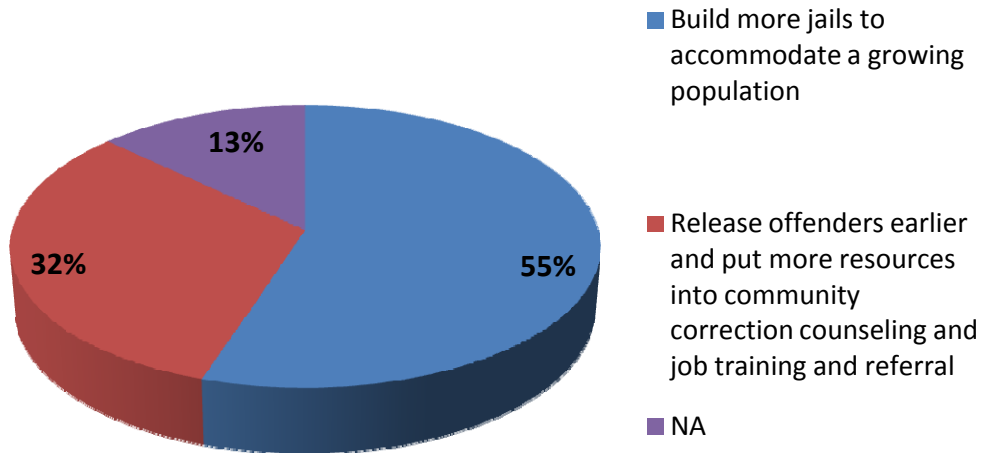

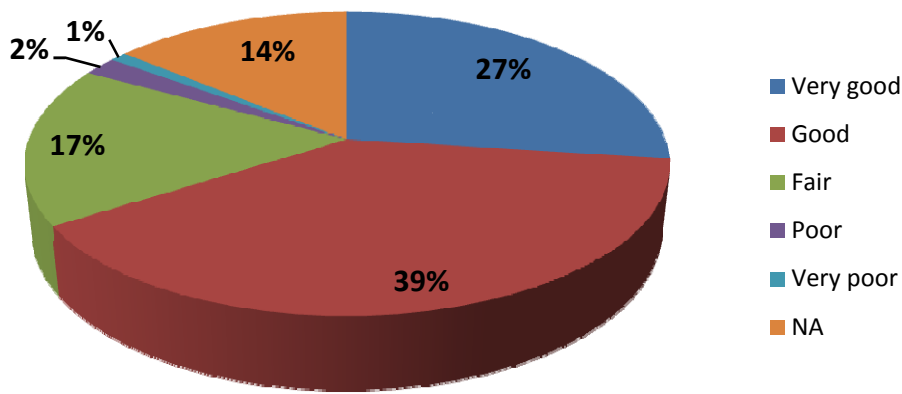
