King Street Odor Control Project Update - February 5, 2009

Weller Street Bridge access through Qwest Field parking lot rerouted

King County's contractor for the King Street Odor Control project will clean and return the northeastern corner of the Qwest Field parking lot to use on Friday, February 6. The existing pedestrian walkway will be removed and replaced by a painted walkway more closely aligned along the parking lots northern and northeastern borders.

Access to the walkway from South King Street and Weller Street Bridge will remain the same; only the route through the parking lot will change.

Walkway users are urged to follow the striped corridor through the parking lot and take extra caution to avoid all vehicles.

What to expect

- The walkway through Qwest Field's parking lot will be rerouted to the north and northeast.
- The existing candlesticks and tape corridor will be removed. A striped corridor along the new route.
- Cars seeking to park or leave the parking lot may enter the corridor.
 Please be careful and aware of moving vehicles when passing through the parking lot.

King County is committed to being a good neighbor during construction. The project team will continue to work with community members to minimize disruptions to the daily lives of those living and working near the construction zone.


