### Registering to vote

#### Requirements

To register to vote in Washington, you must be:

- · A citizen of the United States:
- · A legal resident of Washington State;
- · At least 18 years old by Election Day; and
- Not under the authority of the Department of Corrections.

#### How to register

- Register online with the Secretary of State, www.vote.wa.gov.
- Download a registration form from the King County Elections website and return it by mail.
- Register in person at the King County Elections office or annex.

#### Registration deadlines

While you may register to vote at any time, there are registration deadlines prior to each election. The deadlines for the February 12, 2013, special election:

- **January 14** Deadline to register to vote online or by mail, or update existing voter registration information.
- February 4 In-person registration deadline for people not currently registered in Washington.
   Register in person at the Elections office in Renton or at the Voter Registration Annex in Seattle.

#### Keep your voter registration current

Update your registration if you have moved or changed your name, or if your signature has changed. Simply submit a new registration form to update your information.

# **Accessible voting center**

Accessible voting centers are available for voters who need assistance completing their ballot. Trained staff and specialized equipment is available to help voters with disabilities cast a private, independent ballot.

Voters may also return ballots at these locations during business hours.

# Returning your ballot

Voting begins as soon as you receive your ballot in the mail. Consider returning it early to be counted in election night results and to have time to resolve any issues with your signature.

#### Through the mail

You can vote and return your ballot through the U.S. Postal Service as soon as you receive it.

Ballots must be postmarked by February 12. This requires first class postage.



#### **Ballot drop boxes**

Return your ballot without using the U.S. Postal Service or a first class stamp at a ballot drop box. Ballot drop boxes are open 24-hours a day beginning Thursday, January 24.

By law, ballots cannot be accepted at ballot drop box locations after 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

#### Proposition No. 1 Operations Levy

The Board of Directors of Seattle School District No. 1 requests approval of an operations levy for education, as set forth in Resolution No. 2012/13-3. This proposition authorizes the District to levy the following excess taxes, to replace an expiring levy and maintain current funding levels in order to support the District's educational programs and operations, on all taxable property within the District:

#### Statement in favor

Please **RENEW** this essential Seattle Public Schools Operations Levy. Its passage is vital to the quality of education we are able to provide the more than 49,800 students currently enrolled – and the 7,000 additional students expected in the next ten years. A great city must have great public schools.

The Operations Levy **replaces our current levy** and provides every school with vital funding for day-to-day education needs that are not fully funded by the state. It accounts for 26% of the District's operating budget. The Operations Levy helps pay for items such as teachers, a sixth period at high schools, supplies, bilingual and special education services, security, and student activities such as music and athletics. Without these funds, our children's education will suffer – teachers and staff would be laid off, class sizes increased and important programs cut.

This levy is not a new tax. It replaces the expiring Operations Levy. Please vote to renew our commitment to Seattle's children.

#### **Explanatory statement**

Seattle Public Schools requests voter approval of an operations levy of \$551.9 million in the aggregate for the three year period from 2014 to 2016. The proposed levy will replace an expiring levy.

Passage of Proposition No. 1 would allow the levy of taxes over a three year period to pay for the education programs and operations and to meet the education needs of the students attending District schools. The money in and to be paid into the General Fund of the District is insufficient to meet those needs without additional funds.

Programs and services to be funded by the levy include: 6th period classes at middle and high school levels; teachers and instructional assistants; textbooks and classroom supplies; bilingual and special education services; student transportation, security, maintenance and other operations; student activities, such as athletics, arts, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities; professional development and training.

The total amount to be collected will be \$167.2 million in 2014, \$185.1 million in 2015 and \$199.6 million in 2016. The estimated levy rates per \$1,000 of assessed value will range from \$1.45 per one thousand for 2014 collections to \$1.60 per one thousand for 2016 collections. The exact levy rate will be adjusted based upon the actual assessed value of the property within the District at the time of the levy.

#### Statement in opposition

The Seattle School District's enrollment rate continues to grow; yet the school district has continually used and mismanages many of the funds provided to them. Countless dollars are not being spent on repairs; schools are taking a loss in funds by selling school at losses only to reopen them.

In 2009 the school district was offered \$9.7 million for the sales of Martin Luther King Elementary. When all was said and done they voted to sell it to a non-profit church for \$2.3 million. This is lost money that could have provided much needed maintenance. Arbor Heights the oldest school in the district and the most in need of repairs is not even part of the money allotted in the levy. Now the school district is nearly \$550 million in back repairs.

This mismanagement of funds is not helping our students. We need improvement in our schools. Do you as a voter want to see your tax dollars go down the drain?

Vote NO on the operations Levy

#### Rebuttal of statement in opposition

**Renewing** the Operations Levy is critical to ensuring a quality education for our kids. It provides over 25% of the funds needed to operate our schools – money that benefits every one of our students and that the state does not provide.

The Con statement is incorrect. The separate Capital Levy will replace the Arbor Heights building and reduce the maintenance backlog.

#### Proposition No. 2 Capital Levy

The Board of Directors of Seattle School District No. 1 requests approval of a capital levy as described in Resolution No. 2012/13-4. The proposition replaces an expiring capital levy and authorizes the levy of excess taxes to fund the Building Excellence Program for earthquake, safety projects, construction or renovation at 13 schools, projects for increased enrollment and major maintenance at 20 schools, and technology improvements and other projects throughout the District:

#### Statement in favor

#### **Explanatory statement**

Seattle Public Schools requests voter approval of a capital levy of \$694.9 million for the Building Excellence Program, Phase IV. The proposed levy will replace an expiring levy.

Passage of Proposition No. 2 would allow the levy of taxes over a six year period to pay for construction measures for earthquake and other safety projects at 37 schools, to construct, renovate, replace or make additions to 11 elementary schools, one middle school and one K-8 school, construction of building condition and infrastructure improvements and major preventive maintenance at 20 schools, and acquisition and installation of technology improvements and other capital improvements throughout the district to meet the current and future educational needs of its students. Such funds may be used only to support the construction, modernization, remodeling to school facilities or technology improvements and training.

The total amount to be collected will be \$115,816,667 annually, to be collected in each of the six years commencing 2014 through 2019. The estimated levy rates per \$1,000 of assessed value will range from \$1.00 per one thousand for 2014 collections to \$0.82 per one thousand for 2019 collections. The exact levy rate will be adjusted based upon the actual assessed value of the property within the District at the time of the levy.

#### Statement in opposition

Levies should fix schools, not harm them. This 695 million Capital levy will harm schools.

- Don't kill off neighborhood schools with "Walmart-size" elementary schools. Six new giant 650-student schools: Arbor Heights, Genesee Hill, Olympic Hills, Thornton Creek, Wilson Pacific, Wing Luke.
- 2. Don't put TWO schools at Thornton Creek (zaps playfield).
- 3. Don't move Schmitz Park to Genesee Hill; honor Schmitz family land gift.
- 4. Don't evict Native American programs from Wilson Pacific; don't demolish building-high Native American-themed murals.
- 5. Don't evict Pinehurst alternative program.
- 6. Don't toss 80 usable portables.
- Caution: District's consultant expects enrollment out-migration when houses start to sell again.

- Board voted to abandon its authority and allow Superintendent to waive any Board Policy. (5-2, Directors Carr, DeBell, Martin-Morris, McLaren, Smith-Blum voted yes) (02/15/2012)

- Contracting scandal. (Google "Red Flags Stranger") (Google "Auditor Report 1005180")
- Board cut public input. (4-3, Carr, DeBell, McLaren, Smith-Blum voted yes) (03/07/2012)
- Board brought back commercial advertising. (7-0; terms expire 2013 or 2015: Carr '15, DeBell '13, Martin-Morris '15, McLaren '15, Patu '13, Peaslee '15, Smith-Blum '13) (06/20/2012)

#### Rebuttal of statement in favor

#### Levy's stealth harm:

- District took fright at openly asking voters to fund the debt of new administrative headquarters. Instead, District discussed siphoning off "expected levy underspend" to pay headquarters debt. (Background: Google "\$50 million Glass Elephant – Weekly")
- Behind Arbor Heights' expansion lurks Director McLaren's prior proposal to close nearby Roxhill.
- District discussed supplying "infrastructure" for non-education commercial advertising scoreboards.
