### Resolution

**Proposed No.** 09-06.2

| 1  | A RESOLUTION encouraging the state, insurers, health                                    |
|----|-----------------------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| 2  | care providers, parents and individuals to support childhood                            |
| 3  | immunization as an effective means of communicable                                      |
| 4  | disease control.                                                                        |

| 6  | WHEREAS, through the Universal Vaccine Purchase Program, the state of                   |
| 7  | Washington historically purchased and distributed all childhood vaccines at no cost to  |
| 8  | providers for patients from birth through eighteen years old, without eligibility       |
| 9  | restrictions, and                                                                       |
| 10 | WHEREAS, many other states purchase and distribute vaccines only for federal            |
| 11 | Vaccines for Children ("VFC") eligibility categories, which are Medicaid, Native        |
| 12 | American, uninsured and, at federally qualified health centers only, underinsured       |
| 13 | populations, and                                                                        |
| 14 | WHEREAS, in most states insurance companies include vaccines as a covered               |
| 15 | benefit, and                                                                            |
| 16 | WHEREAS, facing a budget shortfall of historic proportions, the State has               |
| 17 | eliminated its Universal Vaccine Purchase Program, and beginning on July 1, 2009, state |

| 18 | funds will no longer be used to purchase human papillomavirus vaccine (HPV), and by       |

| 19 | May 1, 2010, state funds will no longer be used to purchase all other childhood vaccines, |
| 20 | or earlier if state funds are exhausted before then, and                                  |
| 21 | WHEREAS, the state will continue to participate in the "VFC" program and may              |
| 22 | use additional federal funds to provide vaccines for low income children in state-        |
| 23 | sponsored health programs, and                                                            |
| 24 | WHEREAS, health care providers are affected by the changes in that new vaccine            |
| 25 | inventory would need to be purchased and insurance billed for the cost of immunization,   |
| 26 | and                                                                                       |
| 27 | WHEREAS, Public Health – Seattle & King County works closely with over                    |
| 28 | three hundred health clinics in King County to assure access and appropriate usage of     |
| 29 | vaccine and in other ways improve immunization coverage rates, and                        |
| 30 | WHEREAS, there is a need to optimize immunization coverage through effective              |
| 31 | public-private collaboration, in order to reach national Healthy People 2010 goals of     |
| 32 | ninety percent completion rate for each vaccine and eighty percent coverage for the child |
| 33 | immunization series, and                                                                  |
| 34 | WHEREAS, vaccine preventable-diseases such as pertussis, measles, mumps,                  |
| 35 | seasonal influenza, Haemophilus influenza type B (HIB), viral hepatitis, human            |
| 36 | papillomavirus (HPV)-associated cervical cancer and infections, invasive pneumococcal     |
| 37 | and meningococcal disease and others continue as significant public health threats in the |
| 38 | United States and other areas of the world, and                                           |
| 39 | WHEREAS, Washington State and King County continue to experience outbreaks                |
| 40 | of serious diseases such as pertussis and measles, and                                    |

| 41 | WHEREAS, study after study show the safety of immunizations among children                  |

| 42 | and their effectiveness in reducing death and illness due to communicable diseases          |

| 45 | WHEREAS, immunization is one of the most effective and necessary ways to                    |
| 46 | control the spread of disease and increase healthy life years for people in King County;    |
| 47 | NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH OF                                    |
| 48 | KING COUNTY:                                                                                |
| 49 | A. The Board of Health requests that the Washington state Department of Health              |
| 50 | consider how it may facilitate the group purchase of vaccines for use by medical            |
| 51 | providers and health insurance companies, and to assure that adequate resources from        |
| 52 | federal three hundred seventeen immunization are allocated to Public Health to assure an    |
| 53 | effective transition from the current system for immunization providers and stakeholders.   |
| 54 | B. The Board of Health requests that the Washington state Office of the                     |
| 55 | Insurance Commissioner consider establishment of rules, requirements, or guidance for       |
| 56 | health insurance companies to include the cost of vaccines as a fully covered benefit.      |
| 57 | C. The Board of Health encourages health insurance companies to include the                 |
| 58 | cost of vaccines as a fully covered benefit and without additional cost to the insured.     |
| 59 | D. The Board of Health encourages companies who are self-insured for health                 |
| 60 | benefits to include the cost of vaccines as a fully covered benefit for their employees and |
| 61 | their dependents.                                                                           |

| 62 | E. The Board of Health urges health care providers to plan for the purchase of          |
|----|-----------------------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| 63 | vaccines and to implement systems to actively encourage their clients to receive        |
| 64 | vaccination and track and monitor immunization rates among their clients.               |
| 65 | F. The Board of Health urges parents to protect the health of our children by           |
| 66 | ensuring that their children complete the recommended childhood vaccination series in a |
| 67 | timely manner.                                                                          |
| 68 | G. The Board of Health encourages all adults and children to obtain vaccinations        |
