## **Description of Proposal**

The 2018 amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and Development Regulations are of a non-project nature, are primarily procedural, and have a countywide effect rather than a site-specific effect:

- Comprehensive Plan shifts from four-year major update schedule to eight-year statutory review with an option for a four-year midpoint review;
- Retains schedule for annual updates, including adoption of Community Service Area subarea plans;
- Authorizes a 2020 four-year midpoint Comprehensive Plan update, and establishes process;

- Modifies schedule for the subarea plans to reflect updated approach and Comprehensive Plan schedule changes; adds geographies that will receive subarea planning;
- Updates timelines and text for several action items and adds several action items; and
- Other policy changes are narrow and non-substantive.

The proposed 2018 Comprehensive Plan amendments, contained in Attachment A to Proposed Substitute Ordinance 2018-0153.2, as reported out of the Planning, Rural Services, and Environment Committee, would affect the following chapters of the Comprehensive Plan: Cover Letter; Executive Summary; Chapter 1: Regional Growth Management Planning; Chapter 2: Urban Communities; Chapter 3: Rural Areas and Natural Resource Lands; Chapter 8: Transportation; Chapter 10: Economic Development; Chapter 11: Community Service Area Planning; Chapter 12: Implementation, Amendments and Evaluation; and the Glossary.

Amendments are also made to the Vashon-Maury Island Community Service Area Subarea Plan, Chapter 11: Implementation, contained in Attachment B to the Proposed Substitute Ordinance. Last, amendments are proposed to the development code for consistency with the aforementioned Comprehensive Plan and Subarea Plan changes.

### **Threshold Determination**

King County has determined that this proposal will <u>not</u> have a probable significant adverse impact on the environment. An environmental impact statement (EIS) is not required under RCW 43.21C.030(2)(c). This finding is made pursuant to RCW 43.21C, KCC 20.44 and WAC 197-11 and based on the attached SEPA Environmental Checklist.

As described more fully in the Environmental Checklist, the 2018 amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and Development Regulations are of a non-project nature, are primarily procedural, and have a countywide effect rather than a site-specific effect. As such, it is not anticipated that the amendments would affect the extent, intensity or rate of impacts to water or air resources, noise levels, or toxic or hazardous substances.

King County's shift from a four-year review to an eight-year review, while still allowing for annual amendments when needed to address a variety of issues, will reduce land use changes that could have a potentially adverse environmental impact. Changes remain allowed on an annual basis and changes allowed to address specific defined circumstances are found in King County Code Title 20.18.030.

The effect of the 2018 Comprehensive Plan amendments are relatively limited and are intended to move from a full review of the plan every four years to a full review of the plan every eight years, consistent with State Growth Management Act timelines. The intent of this change is to better align the Comprehensive Plan process with statewide and regional planning timelines in the central Puget Sound area, and to provide more capacity for local subarea planning which was reinitiated by King County in 2015-16.

### **Description of Adopted Documents**

The Countywide Planning Policies' Environmental Impact Statements and the VISION 2040 EISs analyze the environmental impacts of policies that serve as the framework for the comprehensive plans for King County and its local jurisdictions. The King County Comprehensive Plan Draft and Final Supplemental EISs analyze the environmental impacts of planning policies and land use designations adopted by the development regulations. The 1994, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012 and 2016 Addenda to the King County Comprehensive Plan EIS provide additional information and analysis about changes to policies, land use designations, and zoning. The Best Available Science for the King County Critical Areas Ordinance provides additional information and analysis of the policies and regulations relating to the protection of critical areas. The Shoreline Master Program Technical Appendix provides additional information and analysis of King County's shorelines subject to the Shoreline Management Act. The 1964, 1985, 2004, 2007, 2008, 2012 and 2016 Comprehensive Plans and related documents implement policies, land use, and zoning to focus growth in urban areas, protect rural areas from sprawling, low density development, protect natural resource lands including farms, forest and mineral resource land, and protect environmentally sensitive areas.
