





Agricultural Drainage Tour - Remlinger Farms

Join KCD at Remlinger Farms to learn about agricultural drainage and fish passage projects on rural lands. Tour the projects completed at Remlinger's and discuss the benefits of these types of projects for land managers and local wildlife.

Sediment removal projects help reduce flooding and riparian plantings help reduce future sediment accumulation. Controlling weedy species, like reed canary grass, improves habitat quality for fish and other wildlife. If you have questions about these projects and the assistance available, or if you have had a hard time imagining what a riparian buffer would look like on your property, then this is the tour for you.

# HB 1849 was introduced in response to farmers asking for help in reducing crop damage and property damage caused by elk.

HB 1849 directs WA Dept. of Fish & Wildlife to work with tribal comanagers to establish a statewide elk management program based on the elk management pilot project established in 2017.

The purposes of the elk management program are to reduce elkvehicle collisions on highways and elk damage to private crop lands and properties, and to improve and support the health of elk herds.

The department and the comanagers must invite affected federally recognized Indian tribes, the department of natural resources, the department of transportation, the department of agriculture, local governments, agricultural producers, and hunting groups to participate in all aspects of the elk management program.

Introduced Mar 24, did not make it out of committee due to lateness, but lots of good content

## Origin & Task Force



This plan's scope of work was created by Fish, Farm, Flood (FFF), but it is also a stand-alone agricultural plan to guide support for agricultural needs in the Snoqualmie Valley Agriculture Production District (SVAPD) over the next 25 years.



In March 2019, the Agriculture Task Force was formed and convened by King County Agriculture Staff. The task force worked on the problems facing the commercial farming sector in the SVAPD in managing the agriculture land resource for farming productivity.






### Operations Grouped by Landowner


#### **Snoqualmie Valley Commercial Farm Leases 2019**






