1 KING COUNTY, WASHINGTON 2 MAR 11 2020 3 4 DEPARTMENT OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION 5 6 IN THE SUPERIOR COURT OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON 7 IN AND FOR KING COUNTY 8 IN THE MATTER OF NO. 20-0-12050-5 THE RESPONSE BY 9 KING COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH **EMERGENCY ORDER #1** 10 EMERGENCY IN WASHINGTON ORDER ON EXPANDED CRITERIA FOR EXCUSING JURORS BASED STATE 11 UPON PUBLIC HEALTH **EMERGENCY** 12 13 14 15 This matter comes before the Court on the public health emergency in Washington State. 16 On February 29, 2020, Governor Jay Inslee declared a state of emergency due to 1. 17 the public health emergency posed by the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). 18 On March 4, 2020, Washington Supreme Court Chief Justice Debra Stephens 2. 19 entered an Emergency Order that states, in part, as follows: 20 WHEREAS, during this state of emergency, it may become necessary for courts in these 21 counties to close, relocate, or otherwise significantly modify their regular operations; and WHEREAS , the presiding judges in these counties need sufficient authority to effectively 22. administer their courts in response to this state of emergency, including authority to adopt, modify, and suspend court rules and orders as warranted to address the emergency conditions. 23 THEREFORE, pursuant to the Court's authority to administer justice and to ensure the safety of court personnel, litigants, and the public, It IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT: 24 I. The Presiding Judges of the Washington courts are authorized to adopt, modify, and 25 rules orders, and to take further actions concerning suspend court and

- 3. The King County Public Health and the Center for Disease Control have both recently recommended that people at higher risk of severe illness should stay home and away from large groups of people as much as possible, including public places with lots of people and large gatherings where there will be close contact with others. This includes concert venues, conventions, sporting events, and crowded social gatherings. These health officials identify people at high risk as including people:
 - Over 60 years of age
 - With underlying health conditions including include heart disease, lung disease, or diabetes
 - With weakened immune systems
 - Who are pregnant
- 4. Jury Service in the King County Superior Court necessarily involves congregating in relatively close proximity groups of 200 or more persons who come to court in response to a summons.

Therefore, IT IS ORDERED under the authority by Chief Justice Stephens' Order and the authority as a Presiding Judge for King County that the Superior Court shall enact policies to automatically excuse persons from jury service who are summoned and fit the public health criteria for high risk populations.
