Share stories/Problem Solving	Transgender youth exiting from JRA. Grandparents don't want them home – have to give up guardianship? Need something in between hospitalization and living at home. Suggestions: CRT, use IEP to get residential school placement. Challenges: age of consent.	Peggy to follow up with Lisa and potentially fill out challenge solution form.
Workplan Review	<p>Priority # 1: Map or flow chart for services - “if this is a problem here’s where you can go...” Updated WISE brochure in layman’s terms. Special ed directors meeting updates regularly. Identifying how users from MCO’s, contacting them and telling them about WISE.</p> <p>Priority # 2: Ask school districts for their data, identifying which ones to focus on. Talk to districts about what’s working, and how to duplicate. Contracting with independent behavioral health agency to assess behavioral integration in school to see if it is effective. Advocacy that works with both the family and youth. Efforts to capture students early/preventatively - e.g. school refusal. More effective interventions for truancy. Family advocacy/negotiators for helper/peer training mentoring truant youth.</p> <p>Priority # 3: Mental health first aid geared towards youth, not adults. Mental health training for teachers to teach in their schools. Free and available. Gabe to bring resources to tri-chairs.</p> <p>Priority #4: Outreach ideas - we need more families go where the families are. Facebook page? WISE facilitators to give family flyers and encourage them to attend – and make this an expectation for agencies. Satellite meetings for other areas of King County.</p>
