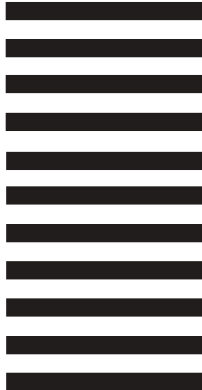

Puget Sound, our lakes, rivers, and streams give us food, transportation, jobs, and fun. Over the next few decades, the region will spend billions of dollars on water quality protection. King County needs to update its wastewater plan so that we make the right investments at the right time. This effort is called the Clean Water Plan, and it will guide the county's work for decades.

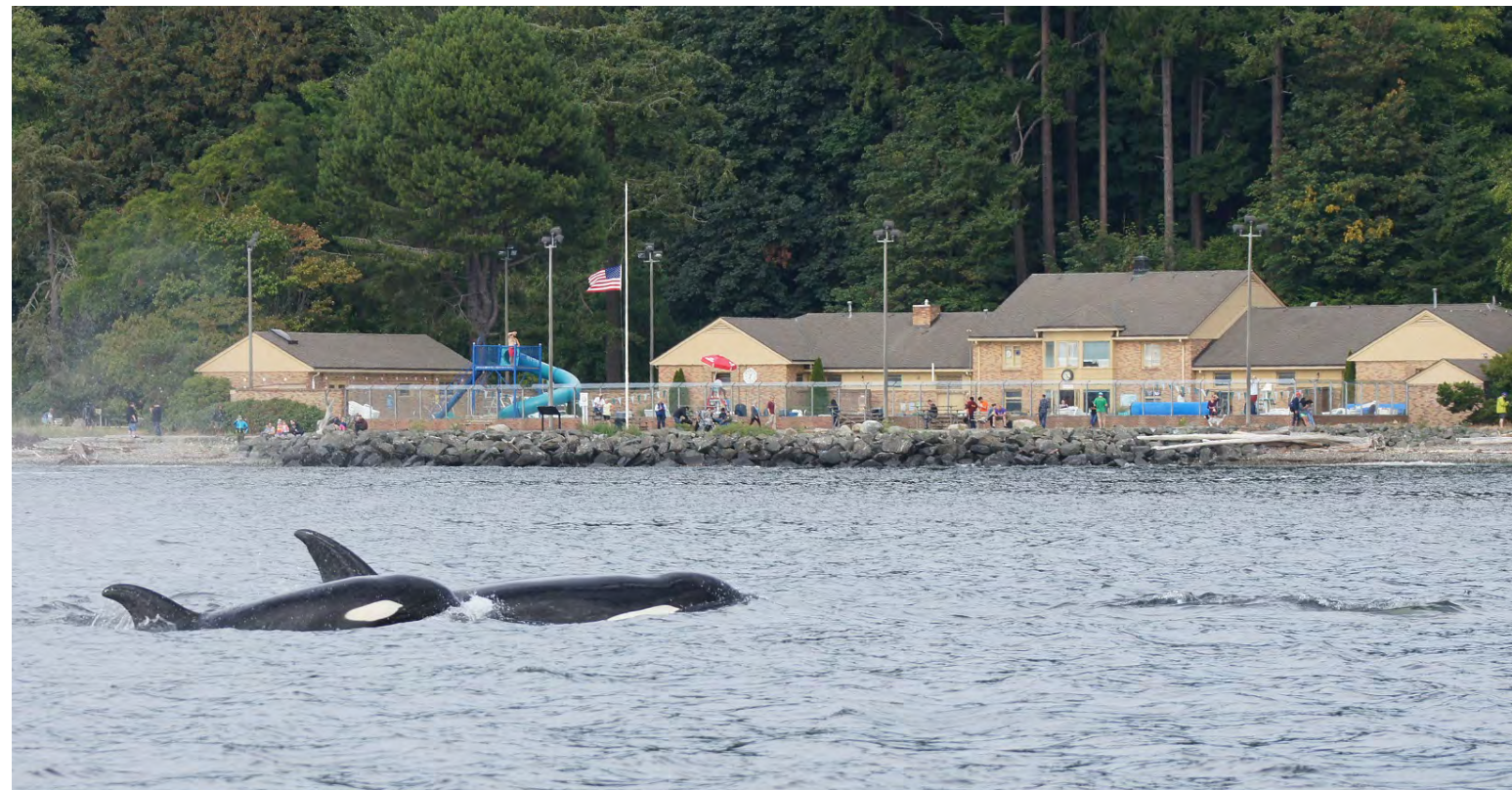
