


Sexual Assault Awareness Month April 2016





What we know about sexual assault:

Prevalent

- I in 3 girls and I in 6 boys experience sexual abuse during childhood
- 23% of women in Washington State reported being a victim of rape at some point in their lifetime

Under Reported

• 60% of sexual assaults go unreported to law enforcement

Offender is Known By Victim

- 53% Family Member
- 36% Acquaintance
- 11% Stranger



- We can't stop what we can't talk about.
- Sexual assault is preventable by Being Loud, we can change information, beliefs, and behaviors regarding sexual assault.



- 3. Promote 100 Conversations –







