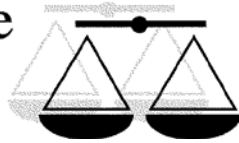

Inquests

Key Points

- The King County Charter requires inquests in all law enforcement involved deaths.
- In 2017, Executive Constantine put a temporary moratorium on inquests and convened a committee to develop an improved process.
- In 2018, Executive Constantine signed an Executive Order outlining a new process for conducting inquests.
- Prior to the Executive Order, inquests were handled by District Court. They will now be handled by the Department of Executive Services (DES).
- DES hired an inquest program manager, Dee Sylve, a former paralegal from the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.
- DES is currently conducting a request for proposals for pro-tem administrators and attorneys to administer inquests.
- Prior to the Executive Order, families who lost loved ones in law enforcement involved deaths had no right to representation. Going forward, families will have representation provided through the Department of Public Defense.
- The scope of work for inquests remains civil and limited to fact finding. However, they now may opine on whether the officer involved followed adopted policy.
