

#### **Alternative Detention**

# **Objective:**

Ensure offending individuals are appropriately detained or sanctioned

# **Strategy:**

Provide alternatives to secure detention to appropriate offenders

# Why is this strategy important?

Alternatives to secure detention allow offenders to remain in the community while continuing to be accountable to the court either pre-trial or after sentencing. Alternatives are less costly than secure detention.

Many persons who are incarcerated have mental illness and substance abuse problems that contributed to their incarceration. By providing alternatives to jail through assessment-driven programs and services, these offender clients are able to access evidence-based, recovery-oriented treatment, training, and employment. Doing so leads to reduced jail bookings, jail days, and inmate health care costs. It also improves their housing stability and employment readiness.

# How is our performance?

King County Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention's Community Corrections Division provides the court system, as well as the offender, with pre-trial and sentenced alternatives to secure confinement. The alternatives and services we offer strive to use evidence-based practices that promote pro-social behaviors and lifestyles (caring about the welfare and rights of others, feeling concern and empathy for them, and acting in ways that benefit others). In order to be eligible to participate, a person must be ordered to the program by the court. All persons ordered must be statutorily eligible for the program.

King County courts order offenders to alternative programs at high rates, indicating that they value alternatives to secure detention, even as average daily population for secure detention has decreased since 2009. The Community Corrections Division's system of record is being replaced and will provide better tools for monitoring compliance in the future.

Through the King County Criminal Justice Initiative programs, over 1,000 additional clients are linked to an array of programs to deal with their underlying mental health and/or substance abuse problems. These programs includemental health and substance abuse treatment, intensive case management, and housing assistance for those experiencing homelessness.

# **Moving forward**

King County Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention will improve tracking and reporting tools in the next year to better understand the proportion of participants who comply with conditions of alternative programs and the re-offense rate among participants in alternatives to detention.

There is significant support in King County to continue providing alternatives to secure detention for offenders with chemical dependency and/or mental health issues, many of whom were experiencing homelessness prior to their incarceration. These alternatives are focused on evidence-based, recovery-oriented services. Plans are to engage individuals in a longer assessment period to assure they are linked with the most appropriate alternative placement. King County will continue to evaluate the effectiveness of alternative programs and use those results to determine future directions.
