- 1. Welcome/Let's Connect.** In the absence of the co-chairs, the meeting was called to order at 12:28 p.m. by Consultant Ann Macfarlane of Jurassic Parliament, who also guided the quorum in an icebreaker exercise.
- 2. Review of Minutes.**
 - a) The committee adopted the minutes from the February 24, 2017 meeting by acclamation.
 - b) Absent a quorum for February 24, 2017 meeting, the committee also adopted the minutes from January 27, 2017 meeting by acclamation.
- 3. Meeting Management Training.** Consultant Ann Macfarlane gave a presentation on the difference between Accountability and Voluntary Association meetings and organizations.

4. Update on OLEO's Progress

a) OLEO Ordinance

- i. Deborah Jacobs reported on the posture of County Council to pass both an Ordinance applicable to any KCSO elected administration and a Labor Policy to include a 'Statement of Intent.'
- ii. Deborah Jacobs encouraged CCIO members to contact, at minimum, their respective County Councilmember and state their support for both Ordinance and Labor Policy. Deborah also provided a talking points.
- iii. Deborah Jacobs too encouraged CCIO members to consider a Committee Letter to County Council in support of Ordinance and Labor Policy.
 - CCIO members Liz Campbell and Tamika Moss will work on a draft and Deborah will assist with final.

b) Muckleshoot Inquest

- i. Deborah Jacobs provided date and location for the inquest; May 22, 2017, at the Maleng Regional Justice Center in Kent, WA, and could last 2-5 days.
- ii. Deborah Jacobs shared that the family welcomes a public presence.

5. Committee Outreach Planning

- a) Consultant Ann Macfarlane and Deborah Jacobs welcomed and invited the newest OLEO staff member, Communications Manager Toshiko Hasegawa, to the table to introduce herself and speak to her goals as Communications Manager.
 - i. Toshiko Hasegawa asked for and received five (5) personal contacts from each committee member present to begin the task of developing an outreach administration.

6. Adoption of Committee Role and Name

- a) Consultant Ann Macfarlane facilitated the ongoing discussion of the committee's role and the members voted to adopt the description (below).
- b) Consultant Ann Macfarlane facilitated the discussion of selecting a committee name that reflected the adopted role. The members voted to adopt the new name for the committee: "Community Advisory Committee on Law Enforcement Oversight (CACLEO) or (CAC)." The new name will not be formalized until the County Council adopts it as part of a revised ordinance on the advisory committee.

What is the role of the Community Advisory Committee on Law Enforcement Oversight?

- The Advisory Committee on Law Enforcement Oversight is an advisory committee to the Office of Law Enforcement Oversight (OLEO) which provides input on policies, procedures and practices relating to policing in King County based on personal experience, community feedback and knowledge attained through service on the committee.
- The committee also advises the King County Sheriff's Office and the King County Council on matters of equity and social justice related to law enforcement and on systemic problems and opportunities for improvement within the King County Sheriff's Office (KCSO).
- Committee members act as liaisons between OLEO and King County's communities. This includes conducting outreach to communities served by KCSO and exchanging information about public perceptions and concerns relating to KCSO.
- Committee members advocate on behalf of OLEO to the County Council, the County Executive, the Sheriff's Office and the community.
